## **Emily Little Off to the Olympics**

Roleystone Courier readers may remember when we reported the wonderful story of Emily Little who came back with a gold and a silver medal from the Commonwealth Games.

Now after four years on the Australian team Emily has now been selected to represent Australia as part of the Artistic Gymnastic Team at the London Olympics and her very proud sister, Roleystone's Leesa Weaver (nee Little) is 'over the moon'.

'Emily was born in Armadale and had her first introduction into gymnastics when she was only 2 years old after watching it on the TV. Not long afterwards, Emily packed her bags and told her mum she was going to the Olympics to be a gymnast!' Leesa recalls. 'She started out at the Armadale PCYC and the family moved to City Beach to be closer to the Institute of Sport when she was 9.'

Since the Commonwealth Games, Emily has gone on to further success. She was on the 2010 and 2011 Artistic World Championship team that finished 6th and in her first senior Australian Championship in 2012 she won three silver medals: in the all round, vault and floor. No wonder she made the team!

She is an all round specialist and now has been chosen to lead the team off - a true pressure position.

Emily's parents, Roslyn and Brian Little have supported her all the way and adjusted their lives significantly to be able to work in with Emily's training.

'They have always been there for the early drop offs and pick ups on a daily basis. They are truly devoted parents.'

'We are all so proud of Emily, not only for





her success but the years of hard work and dedication and the way she approaches her sport.' said Leesa.

So we wish Emily and all the team the best of luck in her efforts to bring back medals from London.

## **Congratulations Terence Barritt OAM**

In the June Queen's Birthday Honours list, Roleystone resident Terence Barritt was recognised for his service to Rotary both locally and internationally, being awarded the Order of Australia Medal.

Terry and Joan Barritt have lived at their family home in Butcher Road, since 1979 while also maintaining strong ties to their family farm, based at Katanning. Terry and Joan's daughter Fiona and her husband Laurie Scidone and their four children are also resident in our town.

Terry's award was for service to the community through Rotary International and reading through his impressive resume of activities it is easy to see why he has been recognised. He has had many years of service to Rotary both in Armadale and in Katanning serving frequently in high office positions and being involved with numerous worthwhile projects.

Amongst his many activities he led a very successful project in the Philippines aimed at harnessing the monsoonal rivers to provide water for irrigation projects across the nation.

Most pertinent to local readers in Terry's recent history is his strong commitment to the local area with regard to arranging the reconstruction of the "Shrine of Resemblance" at Araluen Botanical Park. In 1994 he applied for a \$500,000 grant on behalf of the Rotary Club of Armadale to reconstruct the neglected and structurally damaged WW1 War Memorial at Araluen Botanical Park. This also provided essential employment for unemployed youth and Terry oversaw the work.

This beautiful and serene place does not look like a modern monument rather it is a series of rock waterfalls in the middle of the small valley bordered by the pines planted to commemorate the boys from the YAL who died in World War 1.

The couple have been recognised by Rotary with Joan awarded a double saphire pin by the Armadale Rotary Club for her service. Terry is the recipient of The Rotary Foundation Meritorious and Significant Service Awards and a Multiple Paul Harris Fellow. He has also been awarded the Rotary "Service Above Self Award" by the President of Rotary International. Terry reflected that: 'My work with Rotary has given me a great deal of satisfaction over the years. I am really thankful to my wife Joan, we have always been a team and she has always been supportive.'

#### Kindy Kids Plant Nat Plants at their School

World Environment day (Tuesday 5th June) was celebrated with the Roleystone Community College Bush Cadets and Kindy kids joining members of Roleybushcare to plant native plants in some of the degraded areas around the school. The path adjacent to the kindergarten, travelled by many primary school students and their parents every day, had been partially cleared during siteworks and was one of several spots chosen for this year's revegetation planting.

Roleybushcare (along with a private donation from Councillor Caroline Wielinga) donated 450 local native seedlings to kick start revegetation works at the College this year after the recent construction activity. All of the plants are hardy, local to the area, dieback resistant and will complement the beautiful bushland gardens the local College is renowned for. The Kindy kids were very keen and needed little instruction on how to dig the hole, place in the plant and water in each seedling.

Roleybushcare and the Bush cadets look forward to more plantings with students in the years to come at the Roleystone Community College.

## Patricia's Gifts


The roundhouse gift shop at Araluen has a new manager.

## Roleystone Country Club - Beginnings

In 2012 the Roleystone Country Club celebrates 'turning forty'. There is no exact start date so the 40th celebrations will be recognised over the whole year but with a formal event later in the year.

Here is the story of how 'The Člub' was established.

In late 1971 the Club's foundation President, Geoff Savage floated the idea of establishing a Country Club utilising a property: 'Magic Mountain' off Wygonda Road that had recently come up for sale. The property was owned by a London based banking family that had agreed to allow access to a group of interested people for the purpose of promoting the idea of a Country Club in Roleystone. The property consisted of a large spacious house and caretaker's cottage on 6 and a half acres of land with some of the best views in Roleystone.

(This property had important historical significance as the early homestead and farm owned by the Parkin family and the site of the original Roleystone Cricket pitch. Geoff Savage is a descendent of this pioneering family).

A concept plan was developed and this was followed by a public meeting (held in Feb 1972) on site at Magic Mountain. As a result a 'Promotions Committee' was established to float the club. The original members of this group were: Geoff Savage, Murray Vernon, Peter Coxon, Ken Rose, W Verrrall, R Fraser, D Kane, P Weir, P Bettenay, I Cresswell and H Koldenhoven. Their first meeting was held on the 5th March 1972.

At this meeting it was confirmed that they would make an offer to purchase the property for \$65 000. As the club was not yet incorporated the option of \$100 was taken out in Mr Geoff Savage's own name. Other actions at this first meeting concerned banking arrangements and application for property rezoning. Committees were established to arrange Finance, Buildings (to organise the necessary renovations) and Constitution and Public Relations.

During the next 18 months a range of things were organised:



- the property was purchased (the final price was \$57, 500)
- a debenture system was established allowing the community to get involved
- a bank loan was applied for and granted
- rezoning was organised
- the Roleystone Country Club was incorporated
- a liquor licence was applied for and granted.

On an open day held on the 22nd April, \$6000 was raised towards the project; this was a significant amount of money in those days.

At the inaugural AGM held on the 23rd September 1973, President Geoff Savage gave an address that included the following sentiments:

'Since our first committee meeting, the club has grown from an idea to a moving force of 340 members.'

Geoff concluded: 'the progress of the Club now depends on the support and enthusiasm expressed by members. Please endeavour to make the effort and help in the progress of this community project - a development which in years to come you can look on and use with a feeling of pride and achievement. Progress is in your hands!'

Over the last forty years, the club has gone through many ups and downs. However it has survived. Currently the club is inviting all locals to 'join up'. The membership is currently lower than it was at establishment forty years ago. As Geoff Savage said all those years ago 'it's in your hands'.

POSTCARD FROM DANNY GAERTISER

After a serious diagnosis of bowel cancer Danny Gaertiser (of DMS Danny's Maintenance Services) along with his wife Nathalie and young daughter Erin relocated to their homeland of Switzerland where they had family and could take advantage of a strong health system. Danny shared part of his story with his Roleystone friends through the Roleystone Courier in August 2011 and here, nearly a year on, is another instalment. We are now hoping for his complete recovery.

Hello everyone,

It has been a long and so it seems, never ending story, since I was diagnosed with bowel cancer early in 2011. The shock was deep and some of the consequences will not be easy to live with.

Leaving WA wasn't an easy decision, but we had no choice. Financially and socially, we would've not made it unfortunately. For Nathalie and Erin I think, the move was easier. I found it hard. The sickness and its cure was put before everything else and has always been present with me!

I miss the wide, big, warm land, our friends and my little business that I had set up, and which started to become more successful every day (thanks to RRE) until that devastating diagnosis. A diagnosis that resulted in immediate radical surgery to save my life. And I was very lucky that it hadn't developed any further at that time. I have to again thank Dr Barwood and Dr Wallace for their great efforts.

It all happened in such a rush. I could not really say goodbye to Australia. The chemo knocked me out completely after two cycles and then I was back into hospital for four weeks with life threatening dehydration after losing 12 litres of fluid a day!!!

Coming out of this, I had to go through radiation for 6 weeks. I just made it, with one day off in between. Again, I lost lots of fluid through that process.

When I finished the radiation, they gave me a one week break and then back onto chemo again; it was reduced but it was still pretty hard to cope with. The doctors told me, they haven't really seen anyone reacting this strongly to the treatment.

I finished chemo under close surveillance at the end of 2011, instead of October as planned.

Then I had a break of a few weeks and in that time I started to feel better and better, until I had the first colonoscopy, which they stuffed up! He couldn't see anything, due to insufficient 'cleaning' so I had to do it all over again a week later. After that, the problems started. I had severe cramps and the hospital told me that there was nothing they could do, just take buscopan, which didn't do anything thank you very much!

Then finally at the end of March, after I had 'passed all the tests,' I went back to hospital for the routine surgery of the reversing of the ileostoma. The excepted stay of 4 - 10 days in hospital blew out to six weeks.

It was just too much for me this time, physically and mentally! I had had no food for 4 weeks. I had endured 7 stomach tubes and a lot of other tortures! I've lost heaps of weight but as my variety of food intake is very limited at the moment I am not putting much back on yet! It will take a few more weeks/months until 'everything' will be back to normal.

I also 'picked up' a second thrombosis, because I was not given any blood thinners after I went home after this big surgery. I have now been told I will need to take blood thinners now for the rest of my life!

All this has been really exhausting, physically and mentally. I know, I am still here, but my life has been very, very limited throughout this time and it will still be for some time before things are back to normal.

It is also pretty hard for Nathalie, who has had to work full time and the pressure on Erin who has had to see her Dad go through such an illness.

Winter is gone (thank God) as it was pretty cold at times. Spring was quite crisp and wet too, but then again, I am cold, even if it's 20 degrees. Since the weekend we have good summer weather which makes life a lot more comfortable as I can be outside and move around.

In a week's time we will have friends from Roleystone with us for 10 days. I believe that my health will improve from now on, so I will be able to come back to WA for a visit. For now, best wishes to all of you, and take care everybody.

Running through the finish line was fantastic. Seeing Allen & Dwayne sitting up there & cheering me through the line was a wonderful feeling. I had two wonderful people urging me on all the way. A huge thank you to Annette & Paul who never let me give up. It was great to be greeted by friends as I crossed the finish line.

I achieved so much at the run. I achieved a personal goal of running (without walking at all) 14km, which I completed in 1 hour 50 minutes. I also raised awareness of Intensive Care Foundation and the fantastic work that they do. Thank you to everyone who helped me on my quest to 'Help Make Miracles Happen......'

#### Cross Park Skate Park Refurbishment Project

Thank you to those community members involved in the recent consultation process for the skate-park refurbishment. Four forums were held, two design workshops with local young people and 2 community briefing sessions, on the 8 December 2011 and 23 February 2012. These forums were facilitated by Convic Design in partnership with the City of Armadale, were well attended and had a positive response.

Your ideas, your input and discussion helped to inform the design of a concept plan for this skate park. This information will now feed into a Master Planning process for Cross Park.

This Master Planning process is part of a much larger project that is looking at the way the City's Community Infrastructure which includes facilities such as halls, sporting pavilions, reserves and skate parks can be sustainably maintained, upgraded or modified into the future. In relation to this, the City is establishing an overview of the current and future needs of facilities at 12 community 'hubs' located throughout the City's established areas. Cross Park is one of 4 hubs which will be Master Planned in the first phase of this overall project.

Through this process, the current location of the skate park at Cross Park will be assessed and integrated into the Master Plan design to suit the overall amenity with other uses, whether in the existing or an alternative location within Cross Park. This design will then go to Council for final consideration. It is anticipated that this will eventuate toward the end of the year.

At my time of life, I like variety and have no wish to be controlled by either clock or calendar. To this end Curtin Radio offers vacant time slots and we, the volunteers raise our hands to that which suits. This must be hell on earth for the tireless volunteer coordinator.

Volunteer roles at Curtin include onair presentation (training required), behind the scenes production to make the on-air aspect run smoothly with listener interaction and coordinating weather, traffic, financial and any other required reports, library operation, front office administration, fundraising and open house events, to keep the wheels turning.

It is ever-changing, vibrant, challenging, interesting, and above all fun.

Being there at the different times of day and interacting with the listening public, you get a feel for the 'personal service' that community radio provides and it becomes a privilege to be part of such a team.

My albeit fairly short editorial this month starts by commending the many people who have taken

the time to write letters to the editor this month. Many have arisen after my May editorial where I bemoaned the possible demise of orcharding in the Perth hills. This one is a tough one for me as I am an orchardist's daughter and a real nature lover. I favour minimal interference in nature, prefering no or low sprays and seeking alternative, ethically based strategies where they exist. But I strongly defend the right of farmers and orchardists to make an honest living. I adore the stately majesty of our Black cockatoos and want to see them protected - but if they are devastating an industry due to rampant land clearing elsewhere, is this fair? The July edition has some well argued positions and I will be interested to see how these issues are resolved. I am pleased to see that Araluen has gone ahead and planted 100,000 Tulips and that the staff have been assisted by masses of volunteers. Once again our park will have full spring glory. But it will not be called a 'Spring Tulip Festival'.

Araluen is the premier tourist destination for the City of Armadale. For The Department of the Environment to determine that the tulips can be planted but that there will be no festival and that there will be no advertising, seems counter-intuitive. Let us create one of the best tourist destinations in Western Australia but - let's not tell anyone. Perhaps then crowds of people will not come! Please explain! Happy reading, Linda.

#### Concerns have been expressed on numerous occasions about the spread of Cotton Bush (sometimes called the Swan Bush) throughout Roleystone. The plant grows to 2m high and flowers all year round. It spreads by seeds and lateral roots. It is a very vigorous growing weed and restricts and

inhibits the growth of any native plants that may be nearby. It also impacts on grazing vegetation for stock. Cotton Bush is toxic to animals but they rarely eat it. The Monarch butterflies eat it but do not control its growth. It is a native plant of Africa,

Arabia and the Mediterranean.

A few year ago Roleystone Roleybushcare volunteers pulled bags of this weed out of the foreshore reserve in front of the Araluen Golf Course walkway. Unfortunately as this invasive weed is not being managed either by Council who has the management of this foreshore nor the majority of private landowners, it is now totally out of control. The City of Armadale is aware of the wide expanse of this weed and is currently working through what can be done to address the situation. It will take many thousands of dollars with a coordinated approach by all landowners to eradicate this weed from the valley. This weed however exists on other properties throughout the area and is prolific in open areas on

> the Darling Scarp above Clifton Hills and also grows in the Churchmans Bushland. These areas are under the management of the Department of Environment.

> All rural landowners concerned with the growth of it on their properties should remove it before it really gets out of control. It needs to be hand pulled or sprayed on a consistent basis. Some of the key weeds we have to deal with on rural properties in this area include: Paterson's Curse, Stink Wort, Variegated Thistle and Arum Lilly just to name a few. It is a constant job that I believe all landowners should take on board, if they are to add real value to their property. Plus it will lessen the invasion of weeds onto surrounding bushland and neighbour's properties. The Department of Agriculture will be able to assist you in identifying weeds and what chemicals you may need if you do decide

#### COUNCILLOR RESPONSE

Thanks Pat (Cotton Bush out of Control) for your support in my battle to eradicate Cotton Bush in the City of Armadale.

It does have to be all landowners taking a part in removing this invasive weed as it spreads very readily from property to property. As I reported in the February and April Courier articles, it is not a declared weed in Armadale. The Executive Director of the Agriculture Resource Risk Management responded to the question regarding Cotton Bush problems in the hills by recommending pursuing this weed's gazettal as a Pest Plant under section 10 of the Agriculture and Related Resources Protection Act. This part of the act empowers local governments to make local laws prescribing a plant as a Pest Plant within their municipality. Accordingly I will be moving a Councillor's item to pursue this course of action.

The foreshore reserve opposite your residence where the Roleybushcare volunteers hand weeded cotton bush is vested in and managed by the City of Armadale. The area is slashed on a yearly basis. However, going forward the City will be looking to control Cotton Bush on this piece of land more aggressively. I will be requesting that the management of weeds in this area be considered as part of the overall strategy to best eliminate Cotton Bush in the area.

#### Try Walking a Mile In Our Shoes

I found Mr Peter Stewart's comments in the last edition of the Roleystone Courier to be very negative to our plight. As they say 'a little knowledge can be very dangerous'.

Dragging up old issues of Aldrin, Chlordane and Dieldrin, that have been banned from sale for 20 years seems to be irrelevant. We orchardists belong to a responsible industry that is heavily scrutinised. We ourselves are very glad that 95% of all S7 chemicals have been removed.

Our industry is subject to two MRL (Maximum Residue Level) tests as part of our Fresh Care Accreditation. All our spray programs must be documented with contact numbers and date of purchase, plus sprays must be brought from an approved distributor. Many growers are now implementing an Integrated Pest Management procedure which will help us reduce our spray program by about 30%. We would gladly surrender the use of Dimethoate and Fenthion if a suitable chemical was released that did the same job. At \$500 a container I can hardly wait for the day!

WA growers, due to our drier climate use 50% less fungicides than our Eastern States counterparts. Apples are now allowed to be sent from the eastern states to WA this season but must be fumigated by Methyl Bromide. Yes Mr Stewart, Methyl Bromide. So next time you are shopping for apples at the supermarket please make sure that that you are buying WA grown fruit, it will be healthier for you and this will help our case.

Your comments on the destruction wrought by the whitetailed black cockatoos are partly correct. (We emphasise 'destruction'.)

Why should we, as an industry, inherit a problem caused by other factors, primarily the destruction of 1000's of hectares of trees being cut down for housing development? This has meant the destruction of their main food source. The whitetail black cockatoo is a 'wrecking machine'. It's a pity this species

doesn't emulate the redtail black cockatoo that does not seem to eat

This season they have caused millions of dollars worth of damage to our crops in the hills and across the southwest.

We as an industry do not condone what took place in the ABC documentary invite Mr Stewart and others to visit Youtube 'Damage done by white tailed cockatoos'. This damage was done over

Your comments on netting and sacrificial planting are a bit naive. Netting would cost each grower \$500, 000 upwards. There are not many growers in the financial position to undertake such a project.

Sacrificial planting. This whole hills area would be decimated in two weeks if growers undertook this policy.

There is no quick and easy solution to this one. As one grower put it: 'I think I can survive the carbon tax but I am not so sure I can survive the whitetail black cockatoo invasion.'

In current legislation there is an Act of Parliament that gives us: 'the right to farm and protect our crops'.

I would offer an invitation to Mr Stewart (and others) to come along to our dinner meeting and address our members, offer us a practical vision on how we can survive, while phasing out chemicals and coping with the ever increasing destruction wrought by white tailed black cockatoos.

As Alfred Hitchcock wrote 'One day I peered into a bathroom window, the next day I looked out of the same window and saw a totally different



RESPONSE TO PETER J STEWART

What an ideological pile of dung you have espoused, Mr Stewart (excuse the terminology, us orchardists are a little rough around the edges). The problem with ideology is that it is rarely practical and wholly applicable to the everyday lifestyles of the human race.

The phasing out of Dimethoate and Fenthion is a reverse engineered piece of scientific spin. They saw the result they needed and worked backwards from there. The Australian multiplier number the APVMA used to calculate omethoate (the chemical that dimethoate breaks down into) levels was far in excess of the multiplier number used in Europe.

If the APVMA had used the European multiplier, dimethoate would still be available to use in Australia. That is not what they wanted. They also dropped the acceptable residue level so that, even when dimethoate was used 4 weeks in advance of harvest (as opposed to 7 days) it was still above the target they set, a preconceived target they knew would eliminate use on most crops.

How ironic it is, though, that dimethoate will still be used on all produce with a nonedible skin. Yet, dimethoate is a systemic chemical, meaning it penetrates the skin and moves into the fruit. Think about that when you are enjoying that next banana or orange.

I would dare say, no one would eat more fruit than an orchardist and though we try to avoid it there is an element of direct contact. Yet none of my family members, or any grower to my knowledge, have succumbed to the 'casual link' (in your own words) between POPs and cancer.

'Casual link', interesting term that, not 'direct link', just 'casual'. Maybe we should all take a look at what we ate for breakfast, lunch and dinner, the air we breathed in today, the sunshine we enjoy; I am certain there was more toxic, cancercausing, garbage in all those things than the 'casual link' of those scary, scary chemicals we are all warned about.

WA has a very distinct climate that is a perfect breeding ground for Med fruit fly, more so than anywhere else in the world. I am sure you have all seen whole crops ruined in your backyard plantings, making it nearly impossible to control without dimethoate and fenthion. On the plus side, the consumer will be getting a lot more wriggly little white sources protein in their fruit this year.

Your local growers need your help and understanding, not your fear.

As for the cockatoos, you have obviously never relied on fruit production to put food on your table, or a roof over your head. The horticultural industry is on it's knees. How many brand new orchards have been planted in the last 15 years? Compare that with how many have gone.

We are in an industry where there is no guarantee we will make enough to cover the bills each year, there is no set price for fruit. Plus we are being squeezed from all sides, every cost increase in anything to do with production is borne by the grower there is no avenue for us to pass it on to the markets or the consumer. Now we have cockatoos wiping out hundreds of thousands of dollars of fruit every year. Your solutions? 1.) Netting, insanely expensive. Most netting is put up to protect against hail, not birds. The risk of hail in WA, does not justify the expense (we are not cold enough to get regular annual hail).

2.) Sacrificial crop. Do you actually realise how much work goes into each piece of fruit? 12 months! So we have to work our butts off for a whole year plus all the expenses that go into a crop, just to watch it get destroyed?

Allow me to draw you an analogy. How would you feel if you spent the best part of 12 months time and money restoring a cherry Phase 3 GT HO Falcon, all the tens of thousands of dollars and hours that go into it. Then 1 week before you are set to take that beauty on the road, I come along and smash it to pieces, beyond recognition. But hey, in your sacrificial crop defence, you could buy a Mazda 3 for me to smash instead. You've only lost \$25k, but still have your GT.

If you want to see what havoc cockatoos can do, type 'Damage left by white tail cockatoo's' into Youtube.

## ORCHARDISTS ARE RESPONSIBILE STEWARDS OF THE LAND

Thank you for your confidence that local orchardists have the ability to persist and thrive whilst continuing to serve as stewards of the land (Response to May Editorial-Roleystone Courier June 2012).

BELIEVE ME WE ARE TRYING.

It is not only the banning of fenthion and the damage caused by cockatoos that will have a significant effect on orchard productivity but also, as mentioned in the May Editorial, lack of water, spiralling production costs and poor fruit returns.

Baiting and trapping of fruit fly is already used in combination with cover spraying. Baiting and trapping alone do not provide efficient fruit fly control. This however is the only option we now have and industry trails have shown very little difference to the fly numbers using this method alone.

The Department of Agriculture & Food will be trailing the release of sterile fruit fly in Jarradale. There are no future plans for sterile fruit fly releases in Roleystone. Mainly due to the lack of funds and the unlikely event that fruit fly will ever be eradicated here due to the close proximity of residential areas that mostly have a fruit tree in the backyard. Local orchardists need area wide management schemes involving local government and the community. You can do your bit by purchasing a fruit fly trap and hanging it on your fruit trees. Every little bit helps.

I don't want to get too technical but I thought it interesting to note the following; when testing fruit produce the Maximum Residue Limit (MRL) for fenthion is <5.00 mg/kg with the Level of Reporting (LOR) at <0.05 mg/kg. That means if there is a result of greater then 0.05mg/kg then it is reported.

Interestingly, the last two analysis reports on our fruit show no report for fenthion, meaning traces of the chemical are well below the MRL and even below the LOR.

The cockatoos are an increasing problem over the years. I can assure you we know of the legislation concerning the prohibition on shooting cockatoos and rules concerning scaring devices. An article in a recent Comment News reported dead Carnaby Cockatoos, presumable poisoned, found in Bentley to Bull Creek areas, not rural areas. Netting and sacrificial plantings are extremely cost prohibitive.

I know of orchards that have ceased operation through lack of water and poor fruit returns. We are unable to increase our prices to cover production cost increases, we get what we get. If any of the two major supermarket chains have a 'special' don't expect a sufficient return to even cover costs.

Assistance from Government?, not hopeful, but would like an acknowledgement of our plight and the option to utilize our land for other purposes rather than horticulture.

Orchardists are an optimistic lot however. We intend to have a go under extreme circumstances this season and see how it all pans out. All of the orchards in this district have been handed down through generations or still in control by their original custodians. Our orchard has been operating since 1955 and I would hate to lose it on our watch.

Impassioned, yes. Why shouldn't we be. Everyone has their own battles. Please don't trivialize ours.



## Capturing the Cransit of Venus Most of us could not see much of this meant at least 3 days travel to get north

event as it happened on an overcast day. But local Peter Hunt braved the conditions and saw the event, recording it for posterity. Here he relates his story: Sitting there from 07:15 in a cold wind, full cloud cover and some rain, just waiting, with a visit from several locals, wondering if I'd seen 'it'. And then a 2 minute break at 11:55am, and the panic and difficulty in trying to focus and get some frames into the glare, and beyond the cloud cover; but success!!!

The photo was the effort of six months hope and planning. The thick cloud cover being experienced over WA at the time,



meant at least 3 days travel to get north or just sit tight and hope!!!!

The 2 minute sequence of frames captured was the only 'hole' in the cloud for the complete transit (0720-1340), but I am very pleased with the result, even though not perfectly focused.

Originally a surveyor, and having carried many a sun observations to determine azimuth for surveys and orientation, I've always been fascinated that almost every time the sun was observed, that it produced a different pattern of solar flares/spots, some of which can be seen in the middle of these photos.

As a result of my field experiences, I have always been fascinated with the solar/stellar system and the beauty and magnitude, of the solar system. The science, and a love of the mathematics of astronomy, has always been an enjoyment. Now I have a different facet in that the telescopes of today have the software built in, enabling identification and prediction of stars, and the ability to track a star. 



ASCROPHOCOGRAPHY AT REC

Astrophotography is now being used at the Roleystone Community College to inspire and educate the high school science students. The RCC science teacher Ruby

Rajor has the year 10 students utilising "SPIRIT", a robotic telescope at the University of Western Australia, for their studies.

The students book the telescope by email and then remotely access the telescope through the internet from Roleystone. During school

classes the students decide what they want to photograph, and then they calculate the exact position the feature will be during their booking time and program the telescope.

The students are able to take their own pictures of stunning colliding galaxies and interstellar nebula that are far beyond the planets of our solar system and even the stars of our galaxy. The photograph contents are then researched further in school assignments. And all of this can be done from the classroom and monitored by the students from a warm Roleystone home. How times have changed from coping with freezing winter night temperatures while lining up to 'perhaps get a glimpse of the rings of Saturn'. Very smart idea!

## Funding Support for New Cat Laws Helen Morton MLC

Member for East Metropolitan Region



Love them or hate them, cats represent a large portion of the pets that contribute to the quality of life of many Western Australians. Despite the joy they bring so many people, cats, just like dogs, have the potential to cause a nuisance, damage property and impact negatively on our community and environment if they are not managed properly. Further to this, there is the sad reality that thousands of stray and unwanted cats are euthanized each year in

Although dogs have been regulated since 1976, the Cat Bill 2011 passed through Parliament only last year; however, a lengthy consultation period has helped get the legislation right and provide a consistent approach to cat ownership across all local government areas. The new legislation requires that all cats be:

Sterilised, unless they are being used for

Microchipped, so they can be returned if lost, stolen or stray from homes; and

Registered, so local governments can deal with homeless and stray cats.

During the consultation period 590 submissions were received, from both cat owners and non-cat owners, and there was overwhelming support (84% of submissions) for all three of the above requirements to be introduced. While concerns were raised on the cost of implementing the new policy, the Minister for Local Government, John Castrilli, announced \$3.244m in this year's State Budget to assist pensioners and local governments in implementing the new laws. As the above requirements are not due till November 1, 2013, and as 93% of WA cat owners have already sterilised their cats, the laws will have little impact on most people but should you wish to have further information on the changes, you can visit the Department of Local Government's website (http://dlg.wa.gov.au) or alternatively, you can contact my office on 9452 8311, for this, or any other matter.

#### Support for MRI at Armadale-Kelmscott Hospital

Armadale-Kelmscott Memorial Hospital needs an MRI machine so patients don't have to travel to other sites for MRI scans, according to Canning MHR Don Randall. He has supported a bid by Perth Radiological Clinic to get approval for a Medicare funded scanner to be located on-site.

"The Armadale-Kelmscott Memorial Hospital provides a wide range of health services to the growing area of Armadale and surrounding suburbs, it's the only hospital of its kind in the south-east metropolitan region - yet it doesn't have an MRI scanner," Mr Randall said.

"The Perth Radiological Clinic operates a comprehensive diagnostic imaging department at the site and already has a dedicated space for the scanner, which was planned during construction of the facility. "Currently, inpatients requiring an MRI

scan have to be transported to other sites for the service.

"Urgent requests are dependent on transport being arranged, which includes the cost of an ambulance and accompanying medical

Mr Randall said it was not a safe practice for seriously ill patients, especially for intensive care patients. He said it was important to have the scanner available as it captures images of organs and muscles that a normal x-ray cannot.

"The nearest MRI scanner to the hospital is in a private radiology practice and cannot provide the service to paediatric patients, or an out of hours service," Mr Randall said.

"This is simply unacceptable and I sincerely hope the Department of Health an Ageing recognises the urgent need for the MRI machine to be on-site."

#### GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

I find this time of the year rather puzzling. Already we are seeing the first of the almond flowers out and the bulbs are coming up really well. It is also so lovely to watch the Autumn colours in the garden, but should spring be here as well?

I have had occasion to go to Araluen where the creek was flowing and the red of Autumn leaves, was absolutely joyful. I wonder how many of us locals actually get to see this wonderful garden in all of the four different seasons. The diversity is amazing. The work of the volunteers and staff, needs to be celebrated. We have only two botanical gardens in this state and to have one within very close range is amazing. Let's really appreciate it.

One plant that I feel really deserves another mention is the Gerbera. I know I wrote about it last year, but it went through the summer without any water and now has rebounded into flower. There are about five different colours: pale pink, magenta, orange, yellow and white. Being daisy like, it makes one smile when you see the cheerful flowers. I also appreciate the drought hardiness of irises and liliums, different families I know but generally fuss free and very rewarding.

The wisteria, whilst being very beautiful is just a little rampant for smaller gardens. A tropical plant Petrea volubilis, is much more manageable and has survived over many years in my garden with only rainwater. It is one I planted, when I first came to Roleystone, a bit like the flower of a hardenbergia.

I guess I have planted a lot of plants in the 26 years I have been here. Begonias are great survivors and flower a lot throughout the year. A plant that appears indestructible is Phlomis fruticosa (Jerusalem Sage) although it is meant to

flower from spring to midsummer, mine still has flowers at this time of the year.

A magnificent Camellia sasanqua,' Hiryu' (Kanjiro) sited along Railway Avenue in Kelmscott, is truly amazing and well worth readers driving past it. This is the variety that was often used as an under-stock when grafting, for the early years of growing camellias in Australia.

Last year I bought two Pistachia chinensis from our local nursery and the foliage colours are all that I could wish for. Narelle from the Ornamental Tree Company, had some really lovely specimens and all our plants were able to fit in the back of the car to bring them home. Unfortunately I lost the special maples as I was unable to keep the water to them in summer. Still I loved them while I had them.

The Roleystone Garden Group will meet at the normal time, on the third Thursday of the month, at 9-30a.m at 24 Orana Way Roleystone. I must remember to give the girls some perennial statice, such a good plant, reliable and pretty with little purplish bracts on gently arching stems that grows to about a half metre.

Well the sun is shining again and I have other chores to do.







## **WORM FARMING FOR FUN!**



A worm farm is a fantastic way to turn your organic waste into nutrient-rich fertiliser for your plants and soils.

Worms eat organic waste and turn it into liquid fertiliser and worm castings (the organic material that has been digested by the worms). Both of these products can be used on your garden and on your pot plants to keep them thriving.

At the July meeting of Roleystone Organic Growers, passionate worm farmer Chris Sanders will be discussing the anatomy of worms and how they work, the importance of worms, caring for the worms, and utilising the castings. She will also explain different ways we can make our own worm farms from recycled materials, like old single door fridges or freezers.

Chris's partner needed worm castings for his garden so she started her 1st worm farm 7 years ago. She has worked for the Worm Shed and also given demonstrations and talks at primary schools. Her enthusiasm is very contagious and I'm sure you will

#### LONDON TO PERTH TRAVEL BLOG CONTINUES

Well our intrepid weather man David Elliott and his wife Jackie are still posting their 1972 journey online.

The group, now reduced to David, Jackie and their friend Graham, have finally left Europe and have moved across to Turkey. This has meant that the sleeping arrangements have improved: Jackie and David are now in the tent and Graham has the van to himself.

They have worked on their suntans, drunk a range of foreign beers, smoked numerous strange cigarettes and eaten all kinds of weird (and mostly very cheap) foods. The group are 'travelling poor' and have even tried selling blood for some extra cash. They are moving into largely Islamic areas and this is challenging some of their preconceptions and

Here is part of the entry from Istanbul: 'We'd heard all sorts of tales about what can happen to western women here but we only had one brief incident when a Turkish youth started pinching Jackie's bottom. Jackie told us what was happening. Graham and I said that as soon as it happened again say 'now'.

Of course it happened again soon after and with the word 'now' we both turned round to catch the perpetrator. He then bolted but not fast enough and I caught up with him. I was just about to lay one on him when a burly Turkish shopkeeper intervened and told the lad to clear off, sort of saying that hitting him would cause too much trouble for us."







I am writing this in Scotland gazing out of a lounge room window overlooking the vale of Strathmore. It's cold for summer even by Scottish standards and, although the hills are beckoning, the prospect of a mountain adventure is appealing less and less as another low pressure system is threatening to toss yet more rain on the soggy slopes.

We're staying with our daughter Sarah and her family, husband Will and two and a half children. Number three is expected in September. They have just moved house. For several years they lived in central Dundee, in a two storey villa divided horizontally into two apartments and they lived in the ground floor unit. The small back yard was divided also in two but thankfully vertically, not horizontally. It was walled all round and compact by any standards. The two children loved being outside but the scope for adventure was seriously compromised by the constraints of the tall granite barriers. They were very happy there but only because they didn't know it could be better. Will and Sarah did and have done something about it.

Their new place is just about as different as you can get. They have moved into a country house in almost an acre of well planned garden. They are surrounded by farmland, huge fields of potatoes planted in almost endless straight rows, with not so distant hills crenellating the horizon. The children think they're in

paradise or at least they would if they had any idea what paradise is all about. They whoop and holler about the place, devising games and adventures that only they really know about. It's as if they were wound up springs which have been suddenly released. In a way they are. I'm reminded of an old wind up gramophone I once tried to repair. I released the broken spring from it's case and it uncoiled in one great 'boing', just about filling the entire kitchen in a second. I never did get it all back properly and we could only listen to half a record before the spring expired after my renovations. The children here quickly found ways to fill their new space! They have made dens and adventure trails. Pretend houses spring up everywhere and little Rebecca won't go anywhere without her spade.

Using the two properties as allegories of heaven and hell is hardly fair. But C S Lewis once wrote that our earthly life is such an "indoor experience" compared to paradise and in that context this little parable of two houses has much more resonance. I guess none of us really appreciate how limited and constrained we are if we have no idea how much better things can be. We genuinely need to think outside the box if we are going to grasp what eternal life in heaven is going to be like. And I believe God wants us to have a slice of that action in the here and now. For me I can confidently use the parable to describe the transformation I experienced when I became a Christian. I don't think I have ever fully expressed the release, freedom and love - never mind the sense of adventure - I have revelled in for quite a few years now. The Church generally doesn't seem to have done a great job of getting that message across either. And I would love to put that right. The prospect of heaven is indeed a bit like moving into a new house in the country but we can get more than taste of it in the here and now. We might be living indoors, but there are windows letting in the sunshine and the door's not locked.



For the reserves they were able to back up their performance prior to the bye and collect a well deserved, hard fought victory against Nollamara.





#### Astronomical Highlights June

To some casual observers, the best sight of the month might be the full moon (weather permitting) on the 3rd and/ or the 4th (full phase occurs at 2:52am on the 4th). Better though, and lasting much longer, is the early morning sight of Jupiter and Venus keeping close company in the north-eastern sky at daybreak. For the first week or so of July, these two very bright planets will be within 5° of each other. Between the 1st and the 9th, early risers can watch the way that Venus shuffles about in the triangular star cluster known as the Hyades. It's a good example of planetary meandering. "Planet" means wanderer, remember?

On the 10th Venus will be less than a degree from the star Aldebaran, alias Alpha Tauri, the star at the lower righthand corner of the Hyades. How much is a degree? About two moon-widths. (An interesting aside: from where we are in the solar system, the Moon and the Sun both appear to be half a degree in width.) By mid-month it'll be obvious that Jupiter is rising further and further ahead of Venus and the gap between them is widening. Venus will continue to dominate the eastern sky as the brilliant "morning star" for the rest of the year. On the morning of the 15th, the waning crescent Moon will be in Taurus near Jupiter, completing a montage featuring the Pleiades, the Moon, Jupiter, the Hyades, and Venus.

The major phases of the Moon in July are full moon on the 4th, last quarter on the 11th, new moon on the 19th, and first quarter on the 26th. Then the next full moon will be on August 2nd, the first of two full moons in the month of August. Starting a couple of days after new moon (no moon) on the 19th, the

waxing crescent Moon will become the major attraction in the early evening sky. Recently I was surprised by a question from a high school teacher, admittedly not a science teacher: "How come you can sometimes see the Moon during the day?". Without being too condescending (I hope), I said that the sky above isn't a blue dome, it's not a roof above us, it's just air and air is more or less transparent. The Sun makes the sky glary in the daytime, but if a celestial object is bright enough, it'll show through. You can spot Venus in the daytime, if you know where to look. If the unstable star system Eta Carina erupts as a supernova, it'll become visible as a bright speck in the daytime sky (don't hold your breath for this one, it could be hundreds of years off).

For the first fortnight of July, Mercury will be visible low in the west-northwest at dusk. This is one of its better evening appearances. Being the innermost planet of the solar system, it never gets much further than this from the Sun from our standpoint. Saturn's still well placed for observation (if you have a telescope) and easy to locate. It's not far from the star Spica alias Alpha Virginis, and similar in brightness. You'll find them very high in the north-northeast at nightfall in early July, just as high in the north-northwest mid-month, and high in the northwest at dusk by the end of the month. In binoculars you'll see that Spica has a bluish tinge whereas Saturn looks yellowish. Mars doesn't look like much: it stays high in the northwest sky all month.

Earth passes through aphelion, the point in its orbit where it's furthest from the Sun on July 5th at 12 noon. You won't feel a thing.

#### Wild Gossip: Snail Pellets can Kill Local Wildlife!

The recent rain has brought out snails and people are scattering snail pellets to protect their plants; unfortunately these snail pellets are extremely toxic and kill our wildlife. The

most common casualties are our precious Bandicoots, who forage and dig in our gardens, eat snail pellets, become very sick and die. I had a snail pellet poisoned bandicoot brought to me last week, sadly she had 4 pouch young, all 5 died as a result of this one use of snail pellets. The ironic thing about this is that bandicoots eat snails and help to preserve our gardens! Other wildlife casualties from snail pellets include bobtails, possums and a wide variety of birds such as Magpies, Ravens, Kookaburras, Magpie Larks etc. Ironically all but possums eat snails and help keep gardens healthy. It seems weird to me to use a product in an attempt to get rid of snails that kills the natural predators of the snails. Snail pellets also kill poultry and poultry eat snails. Snail pellets also kill dogs and cats, can make children really sick and also affect adults. This poison remains on the ground and a danger for quite some time before breaking down into the soil.

There are many natural ways to protect plants from snails; these are just a few ideas:

- Stop poisoning the wildlife that eats them.
- Create a natural barrier with crushed

egg shells or shell grit (readily available from stock feed stores and pet shops)

- Create other barriers such as wood chips, saw dust, wood shavings or wood ash - these must remain dry to be effective.
- Copper banding or barrier tape placed around plants will give snails a sort of electric shock to deter. A copper spray also works.
- Garlic or wormwood spray is a deterrent.
- Beer in a shallow dish is an excellent
- Free range poultry and get eggs as a benefit.
- Pick snails off, crush them.
- Inverted grapefruit halves, pots or boards place in the snail area act as a fantastic trap but will need to be checked and emptied early each morning.

There are many more natural solutions that can be used than these dreadful poisons that kill many unintended things, make us sick and pollute our environment. Once you start using natural remedies, everything starts to work together and problems decrease. Our wildlife is precious and needs to be protected from these deadly poisons to ensure that we continue to have wildlife as part of our community.






